Another season is over and I think we can say that we are in a better position than we were



Club Singles Tournament

Saturday September 4th we held the club singles tournament. We had a good turn out with 12 ladies and 11 men.

We played a round robin within groups to determine the play off places and in the ladies semi final Pat Bylok beat Carol Dewey and Baylee van Steijn beat Bozana Brick so the final was between Pat and Baylee. Pat had beaten Baylee in their round robin game but this time Baylee prevailed



winning a 3 end tie breaker after the players had won one set each.



In the men's tournament the play off places were contested by Carl Ferguson, Ken Bevan, Tom Bevan and Bill Arthur. Carl beat Tom and Bill beat Ken so the final was a repeat of previous years. In a close game Bill won both sets to retain his title and complete a hat

trick of wins.

The turn out for the club singles was the best we have seen in a long time and what was especially pleasing was the number of new bowlers who participated.

Traditionally the scoring in singles is first player to 21 points but that can result in very long games. Believe me, games can take 41 ends to get a result! (Ed: The opposite is also true - I've played in District playdown singles where it was over in about 6 ends and I lost 21-0!). We abandoned that format in 2019 and played sets, as we did this year and it seems to work well and leads to shorter games.

Playing singles is a great way to develop your bowling skills. Even if you didn't win a game in the club singles you will have learned something and you will be a better player for it. It was good to see new bowlers winning or sharing a set and to see that a number of those games went to tie breakers.

Cobourg Lawn Bowling Club Partnership with Community Living

Community Living – West Northumberland provides a range of supports to individuals aged 6 and up who have an intellectual disability in accordance with each person's needs, wishes, abilities and aspirations.

Each year for the past 5 years the CLBC has had the pleasure of hosting a group of adults from Community Living on Wednesday afternoons in August, as part of the club's commitment to community partnerships.

Clients from Community Living register to participate in the 4 week program. With the assistance of volunteers from the club, the visitors are given instruction on how to deliver a bowl and how to score. By week two they are ready for a little 4321 competition with volunteers assisting with delivery and bias at one end and another volunteer acting as skip. Support workers also attend to assist with the group and learn how to bowl along side their clients.

Due to COVID restrictions for visitors and rentals, we were not able to host the group last year, but we were happy to be able to have them back this year with some minor restrictions in place to meet our COVID safety plan. The group is enthusiastic, and we always admire their effort and determination to learn the sport.

The Greens

The lawn bowling season runs from May to September but the season for greens maintenance is more like April to October so, if you are passing the club, you will see work still going on. Have you seen the sand on the greens and wondered what is going on?

The sand is top dressing which we do every Fall. After aerating the greens the sand is applied over the whole green.



Top dressing Improves the soil structure and water holding capacity and helps to build up beneficial soil microbes.

It also helps to smooth out uneven terrain from worm castings, freeze/thaw cycle, or water runoff so some of those invisible (to the eye) low spots gradually get filled in.

Other tasks which have to be undertaken include rolling, machinery maintenance and of course leaf removal. We owe a big thanks to our principal greenskeepers, Mike Hendren and Carl Ferguson. They are supported by a small team who assist in cutting the greens. Additionally there is a team of volunteers, led by Bob Bates, who mow the surrounds, clean the ditches and generally keep the grounds neat and tidy. Thanks to all of them.

The Yard Sale

Between September 18th and 24th the clubhouse became jam packed with all your donations for the Yard Sale - there was hardly room to move! On the 24th everything was sorted and priced ready for the day of the sale. Thankfully the weather was kind to us because we would not have managed if we had to hold the sale on the veranda.

At 6.00am we started to put out the tables and the items for sale. The tables stretched the whole way along the west fence



and the benches were also used. Books, DVDs etc were on the veranda.
