

# <u>From the archives - This article was written for the club's 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary in 1987</u>

This year marks the eightieth year of the existence of the Cobourg Lawn Bowling Club which came into being on Monday April 29<sup>th</sup> 1907 when an Executive was formed at a meeting of interested persons in the Town Council Chambers in Victoria Hall. The actual steps in

its evolution are given below as gleaned from the Cobourg World of that year.

In May of the next year (1908) the ladies were invited to join at a fee of eight dollars and bowls were supplied. Twenty one did so. They were allowed to bowl every morning and afternoon unless a tournament was being played. Mr J W Bickle was President this year. Skips were elected at a general meeting and rinks (i.e teams of four) were selected. In the same year (1908) a league was set up to include Bowmanville. Cobourg,



In 1909 the season opened on June 21<sup>st</sup>. The ladies section, at a meeting in the library chose Miss Eyre as President. Their play consisted of singles and rinks. Next year Cobourg men lost the finals in the Lakeshore League to Bowmanville. This league was so organised that four rinks played at home and four away on each of the scheduled days. The membership must have declined as the hope was expressed that they put up a clubhouse when membership reached sixty. Although the Town Council in 1914 granted the club more land to square off the lot, no clubhouse was built until 1925 when a small square building was erected at a cost of \$1500 shared between the tennis and bowling clubs. When a tournament was played a marquee was set up between the clubhouse and the east fence to allow accommodation for serving refreshments. In 1937, at a cost of \$2500 an addition was added eastward, thus doubling the capacity of the building.


Since that time there have been continuous improvements to the club. The original gas lights were replaced by electricity and these have twice been updated; an automatic sprinkler system for the greens has been installed; the greens themselves have been improved until now they are among the best in Ontario. Membership has fluctuated from a low of 20 (plus their ladies) to the 1986 season's 68 men, 80 ladies, 3 life, 20 veranda and one junior. We would like to increase this last category considerably. The men acknowledge that they owe a great deal to the ladies for their financial support and their efficient handling of the refreshments for local tournaments and other club events.

Over the years there have been countless prizes and awards by both men and women in play at local, District, Zone, Provincial levels and even higher. One member, Victor Foxhall, was winner of three gold medals at the National Summer Games in 1969; another, Dan Milligan, won the Provincial singles in 1981 and was on the team winning silver medals at the 1986 Commonwealth Games.

A junior, Keith Knapper and his partner, won the silver at the 1980 Ontario summer games. Helen Cane, in 1975, won the silver at the Ontario summer games. She and Marg Wilcox in 1976 were the Ontario Pairs Champions.

Now in this sesquicentennial year, as well as having their own 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary, the Cobourg Lawn Bowling Club will have a special Sesquicentennial event this summer and is happy to participate in celebrating Cobourg's own Sesquicentennial Anniversary.

# Cobourg Members on the Tournament Trail.

Lawn Bowls tournaments, like many other activities during this Covid era, were nonexistent for a year & a half. Once Covid restrictions were eased a bit this July many clubs started hosting Open tournaments again. Most of these

events are being held at Toronto area clubs or west of Toronto so Cobourg bowlers have to travel a bit if they wish to participate.



The trip was well worth it for **Cobourg's Martin Foxhall** when he travelled to **Burlington on Aug 13** for

the OBA Singles Tournament. It was the 132nd running of this event . . . possibly the oldest continuously run lawn bowls tournament in the world.

8 of the last 10 winners have been Canadian Champions . . . and one that wasn't (Frank Dinardo) had to beat the infamous Ryan Bester to win the gold. Among the 40 entrants were 7 returning winners. So it was no small feat when Martin outlasted the other players to win this years event and the \$600 first prize.

Starting at 8am Martin won 4 straight games then had to endure a long rain delay when monsoon type rain flooded half of the greens. Then at 9pm, 13 hours after starting the day he won the championship match (2-9 end games) besting previous winner Charlie Lyle of Ancastor in the final game. Congratulations Martin!

Unfortunately my day ended early losing 2 games in a row after winning my first one. As Martin was hoisting the trophy I was already back in bed in Cobourg.

The next day **Cobourg's Baylee van Steijn & Peter Stuart - Sheppard** travelled to Cosburn Park in Toronto's east end for the Sophie's Mixed Pairs event.

Cosburn is a large club (180 members) with a lot of competitive players. This very popular event always has a full entry of good bowlers and this year was no different. Of course part of the attraction for this event is that Sophie's local bar is only a block from the club . . . and there is usually a well worn path made from the club to Sophies during the breaks in play.

As it was with all clubs this year there were Covid protocols in place. Players signed 2 waiver forms upon entering the grounds. No coffee, tea or food was served during the day. Clubhouse was only open for washroom use, etc.



After winning their first 2 games Peter & Baylee were matched against current Canadian Singles Champion Cathy Larking & her husband in game 3. The Cobourg duo were 2 down coming home but were sitting 2 in the head for the tie with one bowl to come. Most other games were finished and there was a bit of a crowd on the deck watching this last end. Most were aware that the tournament trophy hinged on this last bowl of the game. (Who says bowls isn't exciting to watch!)

Unfortunately the other skip was able to get close enough for 2<sup>nd</sup> shot and the Cobourg duo lost 15-14. Not all was bad news as their good score allowed them to win the High 2 game winner prize so they came back to Cobourg with more funds than they left with.

We were all a bit tired & sweaty at the end but it was a small price to pay to be able to get out & finally do some competitive bowling with friendly people from other clubs.

# **Cobourg Members on the Tournament Trail -Part 2**

A couple of weeks after Peter & Baylee's successful sojourn to Cosburn Park the team of **Bill Arthur, Carl Ferguson & Bob Bates** made the journey there for the **Richard Bruton Fall Classic** open triples event (Aug 28).

We were lucky that there was a 24-hour reprieve from the extreme heat we had been suffering through. The first 2 games were played in very comfortable conditions (23C with a breeze) while the 3<sup>rd</sup> game was a bearable 26C (feeling like 34C). A full field included players from Kitchener & St Catherines.


It was an exciting day and every game had its own story.

Skipped by Bill our Cobourg trio got off to a great start in a low scoring affair beating Mary Lou Richards (in 10 of the 12 ends only 1 point was scored). Our team won 14-2 which earned Mary Lou the \$5 Tim's cards that Cosburn gives out to the lowest scoring team each game.

In game 2 Cobourg had a 4-point lead over a Kew Beach team heading into the last end . . . but when Bill was throwing his last bowl we were down 4 or 5 in the head. Bill came through with a great shot to limit them to a single point giving us a 9-6 victory. With 2 wins but only 23 points entering the 3<sup>rd</sup> game we figured we had to win the last game just to get in the money as there were already 2 teams ahead of us with 34 points.

Playing Mike Mogan from Cosburn we had a 12-6 lead heading in to the last end. A quick review of the scoreboard told us that both teams with 34 points had lost their last games and if we could get 1 more point we could win the tournament. It was a very close end but we squeezed out 1 more point to win 13-6. After some quick calculations by the draw master he announced that the 2 - 3 game winners had tied with 36 points each . . . . and the Cobourg trio were the winners as they had only a total of 15 points scored against them over the 3 games.

At the end of a long day, we happily accepted our prizes (\$300, 3 bottles of wine, 3 Gold medals & the big trophy) and headed home. I think Bill slept most of the way.
